

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

JEAN-MICHEL BASQUIAT

A life cut tragically short, Jean-Michel Basquiat was an American painter known for his raw gestural style of painting with graffiti-like images and scrawled text. Born in Brooklyn in 1960, Basquiat suffered a troubling childhood before dropping out of high school and leaving home at the age of 17. He lived on the streets, with friends, or in abandoned buildings and began a graffiti campaign that would start gaining recognition in the art world in the late 1970s. He emerged in the aboveground New York art scene at age 20 — about the time that a resurgence of expressionist painting was at its height — and participated in his first formal public exhibition. From there, his career skyrocketed, and, until his untimely death in 1988, he was a full-fledged celebrity, represented by major blue-chip galleries in New York and Germany.

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

OF ARCHITECTURE.

THE POETRY OF ARCHITECTURE

rchitect Will Miller believes that great architecture isn't about size, shape, or materials but is rather an emotional experience made extraordinary by the creation of a beautiful place existing in harmony with its time, place, and purpose.

"I let the character of the site be the inspiration for the design," says Miller, who founded his boutique firm in New Smyrna Beach in 1977. "And so the essence of the design and the palette of materials are entirely different in the mountains than on the beach, even though the process is the same."



A I enjoy the creative process and being able to work with interesting people and interesting sites with the common goal of sensitive and honest design.

What's your general philosophy on building and architecture?


A I have a deep respect for both the client and for the site. I believe the building should be a collaboration between the two, with the client saying 'what' to build, the site saying 'how' to build, and



the architect listening carefully. The home then can be an exciting realization of the client's desires and create an intimate sense of place with poetic depth.

Q Do you design most of your projects in New Smyrna Beach?

A My office is in New Smyrna Beach, but actually most of the homes that I've designed are outside the local area, with several projects in Orlando/Winter Park, Atlantic Beach near Jacksonville, South Florida, North Carolina, Lake Michigan, and most recently a design in Telluride,











OCEANFRONT OASIS The dominant interior feature is the four-story undulating central open space, which accommodates the prominent stone fireplace and continuous spiral stairway that leads to overlook lofts on all levels and to an upper-level roof terrace with panoramic views of the ocean to the east and river to the west. Indigenous Florida keystone on both the interior and exterior give a feeling of casual elegance, and large expanses of butt-joined glass create a flow between the interior and exterior while providing uninterrupted views of the ocean on all levels.

Colorado. No matter the location, my process and desire are the same: to use honest and natural materials that are indigenous to the area and respond to the character of each individual site. If I am fortunate to have a beautiful site, I let the character of the site be my inspiration for the design.

Q It sounds like you were on the cutting edge of designing homes in harmony with the environment long before it was en vogue. How did you develop that sensibility and why is it important to you?

A I'm sure it started as a kid playing outside a lot and respecting nature, and then early in my architecture career, I felt that the structure should enhance the site rather than impose itself on the site. That just seems like common sense to me.

What are the most challenging elements of architecting a home?

A The hardest thing is continually evaluating how each decision fits in with the overall cohesive concept of the home. We have many wonderful products and materials, but they can be distracting if not used appropriately.

Q What is your design process?

A I begin by discussing with the client their needs and desires and carefully studying potentials and limitations of the site. I then hand-sketch concept studies, involving the client early and continually to encourage communication and efficiency. Good design is a process, not an event, so as the process moves from the design phase to the construction phase, I'm always discussing design options with the client and making desired refinements.



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

CURATING A LEGACY





URBAN OASIS Que Throm, wife of the late artist Cicero Greathouse, in their home, Casa Querencia. Inspired by a love of Mexican architecture, Greathouse designed the 4,000-square-foot retreat in downtown Orlando as an art-filled sanctuary.



Q What inspired Cicero and how did he approach his craft?

A Cicero was a passionate painter who practiced his art for 40 years. He knew how to use color, what techniques worked, and what concepts he wanted to explore — like the vast Florida landscape and the coastal marshes, especially the mangroves and river flats of the St. Johns River. Cicero was also a licensed contractor, an illustrator, a printmaker, a sculptor, and very interested in architecture and building. He designed our home, Casa Querencia, which was inspired by the architecture of Mexico, with its adobe color, corbeled entryway, walled courtyards, and tropical landscaping.







Q What will encompass Cicero's legacy in the Orlando community? A Cicero and I have been involved in the Central Florida arts community for 50 years. Both of us have been active as volunteers and mentors as well as gadflys on occasion. We have offered our commitment to the advancement of the arts and artists in our local art scene in various ways - one of which is the Cicero Greathouse Fund at the Art & History Museums of Maitland. With Cicero's passing, it has fallen to me to determine our concrete legacies, a project I'm continuing to work on with the Maitland museums and Valencia College. Also in the works is a public art installation at the Orlando International Airport. Cicero was brilliant, and he will continue to live on through those who loved him and through his paintings, artworks, and contributions to the community.




















PARK AVENUE CONTEMPORARY ART

locating it within walking distance from the
Alfond Inn and other cultural venues in downtown Winter Park and strengthening our city's
reputation as a vibrant arts-and-culture hub.

"The new Rollins Museum of Art will be a 21st-century engaged hub that engenders multigenerational experiences and expansive partnerships, encourages lifelong learning and enjoyment, and builds community by welcoming all and including different perspectives," says museum director Ena Heller. "We are confident that we can fulfill this vision in a new facility and in partnership with a wider and more diverse community."

NEW DIGS

Alongside the rebranding as the Rollins Museum of Art are plans for a new state-of-the-art facility, which will position the museum as a full-fledged community resource in the heart of downtown Winter Park. As part of Rollins College's Innovation Triangle expansion project, the new museum will more than triple the space of the current facility and include larger galleries, an educational wing, an auditorium, cafe, and curricular galleries, all of which will build bridges between the campus and the community.

LEARNING LABORATORY

The mission of the Rollins Museum of Art is to teach students of all ages and provide a link among people, creativity, and ideas.

For Rollins, the expanded museum will be a laboratory for innovative learning through and with art, drawing art students from around the world and playing a critical role in the college's core interdisciplinary curriculum. For the community, it will be a destination, a place to go, a space for learning and contemplation, a hive of enjoyment and new experiences.

EXPANDED COLLECTION

The museum has undergone transformative growth in the last decade, with yearly attendance more than quadrupling since 2012. The rebrand and expansion will allow the permanent collection — which has added nearly 900 works to its collection of more than 5,700 objects — room to breathe and grow through

additional programming and partnerships. From Thomas Gainsborough and Andy Warhol to some of today's cutting-edge talent like Shirin Neshat, the museum's holdings reflect a global, diverse roster with a sizeable American collection, a forward-thinking contemporary collection, and the only European Old Master paintings in the Orlando area.

A WINDOW TO THE WORLD

Through this expansion, the museum meets its moment as it creates a larger platform from which it can redefine community connection. Not only will the museum continue to provide a key to understanding both history and the present, prompting important dialogue, but it will become a gateway that extends

beyond the college campus to educate and inspire while creating a sense of belonging and offering a view of the world enlarged.

HEROES & MONSTERS

THE ORLANDO MUSEUM OF ART UNVEILS A NEVER-BEFORE-SEEN COLLECTION

OF PAINTINGS BY THE LEGENDARY ARTIST AND ICON JEAN-MICHEL BASQUIAT.

t the time of his tragic death in 1988 at the age of 27, Jean-Michel Basquiat had become an art-world celebrity and pop-culture icon. He first achieved fame in the late 1970s as a graffiti artist and street poet in the cultural hotbed of Manhattan's Lower East Side. Professional acclaim found Basquiat when his work was included in a 1981 show titled, New York/New Wave, organized and curated by the famed Diego Cortez. What followed was a furious rush of fame as Basquiat's works were exhibited in galleries and museums nationwide and across the globe. Today, Basquiat is regarded as one of the most important and influential artists of the 20th century. Recently, several of

his works sold for more than \$50 million a piece, with one breaking an American auction record at just over \$110 million.

Heroes & Monsters: Jean-Michel Basquiat and the Venice Collection of Thaddeus Mumford Jr. presents a rare group of paintings from a private collection that are being shown for the first time at the Orlando Museum of Art (OMA). Basquiat created these 25 works in 1982 while living in Los Angeles, and this collection is considered by many to have been created during the best period in his short career. His paintings often contrasted powerful forces within

society and within himself as seen in this first-time exhibition. He had established his distinctive raw expressionistic style and the symbolic vocabulary that would continue to recur in his work, making 1982 both his breakout and crescendo year.

That same year, Thaddeus Mumford Jr. was writing for the hit show M*A*S*H as part of a lengthy and successful career as a Hollywood writer. Running in the same circles of artists and creators, Basquiat and Mumford sparked a friendship, bonding over their love of jazz musicians and sports legends as well as their shared experience as the

very few black men in a white-dominated industry. Both had grown up in Brooklyn, and Mumford was the first African-American bat boy for the New York Yankees.

Needing cash to fuel a raging heroin addiction, Basquiat made a deal with Mumford to paint on cardboard 25 pieces about which the two men composed a poem — which is also on view at OMA. Mumford gave the budding superstar \$5,000 for the collection of paintings, which would be locked away in a storage locker for the next 30 years, along with the rest of Mumford's memorabilia and achievements.

In 2012, the storage locker was auctioned off after failure to pay rent on the facility. Among the treasures were these 25 masterpiece paintings, along with the poem they wrote together, Emmy awards, Yankees memorabilia, and many more of Mumford's awards. After being auctioned to two art buyers, the Venice Collection came to the hands of the current owners.

While never before exhibited or published, the works have been studied at length by experts. James Blanco, a renowned handwriting analyst, has certified that the multiple signatures and profuse writing on

the works are indeed that of Basquiat. Dr. Jordana Moore Saggese, an art historian who has published prolific academic research on Basquiat and remains the leading expert on his life and works, has analyzed and attributed the works as belonging to Basquiat. She would later serve as a consultant, preparing a report that cites Basquiat's life, themes, and historical significance as the reasons supporting the paintings' authenticity.

Cortez, the celebrated curator who discovered Basquiat in the early stages of his career, maintained a close relationship with the virtuoso until his untimely death and went on

to certify that these rare works belonged to Basquiat. Cortez was a co-founding member of the Basquiat Authentication Committee for the Basquiat estate until its dissolution several years ago before these works were discovered. Nonetheless, Cortez hand-signed letters of authenticity on each of these works because given the value and market on Basquiat, finding a cache with such a story and provenance is the find of a lifetime. 






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GREYSON CHARNOCK




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MARTHA JO MAHONEY PAINTER

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



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
